# Kindergarten The Kindergarteners have been busy exploring signs of autumn.

#### **First Grade**

The first-grade class enjoyed a week of apple exploration at the beginning of October. The three classes engaged in a week-long science unit revolving around the juicy fruit. The students learned the anatomy, history, and the differences in apples. The culminating activity for the first graders was an apple tasting day on Friday. Ms. Francis, Mrs. Goldberg, Mrs. Boatwright, and Mr. Marino led an activity where students were able to taste six different kinds of apples ranging in sweetness and juice content. The students were also able to taste homemade apple sauce and homemade apple cider.

#### 2nd Grade

It has been a 'Touchdown to Second Grade' for sure! We have already done so many things! In ELA, we are learning about poetry! We have been writing our own acrostic poems and poems with shapes! In Math, we have done a lot with measurement (centimeters and meters) and place values with numbers. In Science, we have been learning all about Matter. We have built structures with marshmallows, candy, toothpicks, cups, plates, and built our own bridges on our ipads. We are learning how to code! We even got to make Oobleck!

#### **Mystery Science Fun in Third Grade!**

Students in Mrs. Solinger's and Mrs. Liffner's third grade classes have really enjoyed their new science curriculum simply called "Mystery Science." In their first unit Animals Through Time, students have been presented with Central Mysteries of Where can you find whales in the desert, how do we know what dinosaurs looked like, and can you outrun a dinosaur? With each Central Mystery, students recreate the process of scientific discovery in the classroom using the Five Es of Science. (Engage-with an interactive video, Explore-with a hands-on activity, Explain-using discussion questions & supplemental reading activities, Elaborate-using online extension activities, and Evaluate-with a Mystery Lesson assessment.)

Students in these pictures enjoyed an extension activity where they designed their own dinosaurs with traits and features they had learned about in previous lessons. Students were also able to explain why each feature on their creatures was chosen.





#### **Fourth Grade**

Fourth graders released crayfish after studying how their structures support growth and survival as part of the Plant and Animal Structures science curriculum.

Fourth grade students participated in the Fire Prevention Program on October 7.

#### **Sixth Grade**

The 6th grade has begun their year reviewing Math concepts that they learned last year. Some of the topics being reviewed are multiplication and division of multi-digit numbers, greatest common factors, and least common multiples. In addition, no pun intended, we have also been reviewing fractions.

In Science, students are learning about the trillions of microorganisms that live on and in the human body, which all together are called the human microbiome. As they figure out what's going on with one patient's microbiome, students get familiar with the practices of science, including the specific ways that scientists investigate, talk, read, write, and argue. These practices will be important as students study science throughout the year, and beyond.



ELA - Sixth graders are wrapping up the novel Harry Potter and Sorcerer's Stone and the American Reading Company Unit 1. We started the year by briefly reviewing authors, genres, and text designs. In addition, we spent time discussing how to summarize fictional and informational texts. We will finish the unit by exploring vocabulary, figurative language, and essay writing. Next, we will begin our second unit which will be a research project on The American Revolution.

SS - Sixth graders began the year by reviewing basic map skills. Then, for about two weeks, we participated in the writing contest called the Patriot's Pen. For this contest students are asked to respond to a prompt and write a 300-400 word essay. This year the prompt was "How Can I Be a Good American?". The contest was optional, but the essay was not. Currently, we are exploring how people lived prior to the development of civilizations. As the year progresses we will build on the ideas of how people lived and survived during ancient times. However, when we begin the American Revolution unit in ELA, we will take a break from ancient history and spend time in SS learning about the history of the war.

This will greatly help our students with their ELA research.

Jv Volleyball has had a successful season with 17 participants growing their team and athletic skills. We managed a 10 - 1 record and a hard fought 2nd place finish in the VolleyBash Tournament at St. Bonaventure University. We are now preparing for the end of the year playoff tournament!
